COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course examines historical changes and processes in the 20th century and beyond. Providing a global perspective, the course will explore political, social, and economic changes that have impacted people and societies across the world.

Course Activities

Class participation through discussion and other activities are integral parts of this course. To provide structure for balanced participation and allow maximum benefit of enhanced discussion activities and learning, the following are required: 1) Post initial responses to discussion questions; 2) Post at least two thoughtful and topic-relevant comments or questions in response to classmates' posts on at least two different days during the school week; and 3) Respond to any questions the instructor or classmates have regarding the original post by the end of the school week. Other activities that support course outcomes (quizzes, knowledge checks, etc.) may be assigned.

Leadership in History Paper

Students explore the concept of leadership in modern world history by describing a historical event and a significant leader associated with that event. Students reflect on the effectiveness of this leader and the impacts of this leader on modern world history, politics, and socioeconomic events. This assignment helps student gain new perspectives on the concept of leadership and the influence of leaders. Students are assessed on their ability to apply course concepts, synthesize supporting evidence, reflect on diverse perspectives, and write cohesive paragraphs including a thesis statement that is fully supported throughout the paper. This 8- to 9-page paper includes: 1) title page; 2) abstract; 3) five-six-page body; and 4) reference page. The paper must cite at least four scholarly sources and be formatted in APA Style.

Colonialism/Post-colonialism Paper

Students review a current political, social, or economic situation and explain how it was shaped by colonialism and post-colonialism. This assignment increases students' awareness of factors associated with colonialism that impact global political, social, or economic affairs. Students are assessed on their ability to apply course concepts, synthesize supporting evidence, reflect on diverse perspectives, and write cohesive paragraphs including a thesis statement that is fully supported throughout the paper. This 8- to 9-page paper includes: 1) title page; 2) abstract; 3) five-six-page body; and 4) reference page. The paper must cite at least four scholarly sources and be formatted in APA Style.

Research Paper

Students reference course concepts to analyze the origin and development of a major economic, political, social, cultural, or technological trend over the past 300-400 years. Students reflect on historical ideas, issues, and events and describe the impact of this trend on global societies. This assignment increases students' knowledge of the development of modern world history. Students are assessed on their ability to apply course concepts, synthesize supporting evidence, reflect on diverse perspectives, and write cohesive paragraphs including a thesis statement that is fully supported throughout the paper. This 8- to 9-page paper includes: 1) title page; 2) abstract; 3) five-six-page body; and 4) reference page. The paper must cite at least four scholarly sources and be formatted in APA Style.
