COURSE DESCRIPTION

Financial knowledge is the biggest predictor of success or failure of a business. This course analyzes the unique financial issues facing entrepreneurial firms. Topics include assessing financial performance, financial forecasting and planning, financial management of rapidly growing businesses, start-up ventures, valuation, sources of financing, and daily accounting issues.

Instructor Determined Assignments and Activities

Whether in class, online, or in a mixed mode setting, students will be graded on their participation in classroom discussions; ability to present, explain, or defend alternative viewpoints; and the degree to which they have mastered the concepts and principles inherent in the study of business management. Written work will be assessed not only on relevance to the subject presented, but also on adherence to good written form, APA style, and professional presentation. The instructor may also choose to create additional activities to support learning in the classroom or online.

Capital Financing Paper

Contrast different types of financing including bank loans, SBA loans, venture capital, angel investing, and crowdfunding in a 3 to 4 page paper double-spaced. The paper should contrast the different financing options in relation to the objectives of the student's example business start-up. The paper must have at least three resources and completed in APA style. The business analysis should include the pros and cons of each financing option in relation to ownership, cost, credit worthiness, likelihood, and other relevant factors. A chart and an executive summary is recommended but not required.

Financial Proforma

The start-up example will provide the opportunity to apply the concepts, terms, and financial techniques covered in the course. Students will include a narrative of the assumptions that are included in the proforma. This assumption narrative will have full research support for each assumption. Research support must include industry data and competitive research from appropriate business resources. Primary research may be conducted but is not required. Student must show at least three different business scenarios in their financial projections supported by the research.

The purpose of a case analysis assignment is to provide students with an opportunity to apply concepts from class to start-up situations. At the end of each the Profit Mastery online module (five total) are case studies. The student completes each one of the case study worksheets. The student should apply their own company concept as an example where applicable in each of the modules. Please be sure to incorporate theories or concepts from class or other readings and reference them appropriately
