COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is the second in the Behavior Analysis sequence and is for candidates pursuing a special education endorsement. Candidates will apply concepts from Behavior Analysis I in order to make revisions for legal compliance on Functional Behavioral Assessments (FBA) and Behavioral Intervention Plans for special education students exhibiting challenging behaviors. Candidates will also explore the state and federal laws surrounding disciplinary actions for special education students, including Emergency Response Protocols (such as isolation and restraint) in public school settings.

- Laws, policies/regulations, and ethical principles regarding positive behavior management planning and implementation, discipline, and aversive therapy
- Responsibilities regarding procedures for Functional Behavioral Assessment, manifestation determination, and behavior intervention planning

SPECIFICS OF COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Emergency Response Protocol

Candidates use an instructor-provided template to complete an emergency plan that meets the legal requirements of the WACs and RCWs for use of restraint and isolation/seclusion for a student in special education. Candidates identify the legal implications involved in emergency response protocols and the associated interventions.

FBA/BIP Analysis and Revisions

Candidates will critically evaluate a Functional Behavioral Assessment (FBA) and associated Behavior Intervention Plan (BIP). After evaluation and analysis of the documents, the candidate will suggest revisions to increase the quality, consistency, alignment, and/or legal compliance aspects based on their knowledge and skills gained in their previous Behavior Analysis class. Candidates are encouraged to examine existing FBAs and BIPs at their local school. However, if those are not accessible, the instructor will provide examples for candidates who need them.

COURSE POLICIES

Late Assignments

The TCP late Policy is posted under Course Information in the blackboard shell. It is as follows:

• Students are required to submit all assignments by the due dates stated in the course schedule and/or Bb shell. A late assignment is one that is submitted after the due date or after any extension has expired.

• If circumstances prevent a student from meeting the due date, the student must contact the instructor and request an extension at least 48 hours prior to the specified due date. Emergency situations, such as hospitalization, death in the family, etc., will be considered on a case-by-case basis. Situations such as work, vacation, family gatherings, change in plans, or competing academic commitments are not valid reasons for extensions.

• A student who receives an extension in advance of the due date and abides by the agreement with the instructor is not subject to late penalties.

• Without prior arrangement with the instructor, students who submit assignments late will receive a 10% deduction in grade for each day past the due date.

• Coursework received after five days will not be graded and will receive a zero grade, unless prior arrangements have been made.

Participation

Participation will be graded based on engagement in class discussions and activities (both online and mixed modes). Online-only courses will be determined via active engagement in weekly discussion boards. Mixed mode courses will be determined based on presence in class and engagement with content and peers in face to face sessions.

Professional Writing

Assignments require error-free writing that uses standard English conventions and logical flow of organization to address topics clearly, completely, and concisely. CityU requires the use of APA style.
