## Course Description

This course examines public school law with an emphasis on the rights and responsibilities of students and teachers in special education and special programs. Candidates analyze current issues special education and the education of recent immigrants and English Language Learners for positive inclusion in a public school. Candidates learn professional and collaborative procedures for providing services to students in special education and English Language Learners, as well as analysis of their future participation in the IEP process, program accommodations for students identified with a low-incidence disability. Course includes components of state requirements for certification.

This course prepares candidates to:

- Identify and explore the implementation of various accommodations and modifications for students from categorical programs in the general education setting
- Describe, analyze and reflect on categorical programs and relationship with general education
- Analyze the IEP process from multiple perspectives
- Incorporate appropriate learning strategies involving categorical programs
- Articulate the roles and responsibilities of family, community, and educational staff in categorical programs

## **Course Assignments and Grading**

### **Special Programs in Public Education (40% of Final Grade)**

Candidates will write a research paper exploring the impact of federal and state legislation on the provision of Special Education (IDEA), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, and provision of education for English Language Learners in Washington State. The paper will focus specifically on comparing, contrasting, and analyzing IEPs, 504s, and ELL programs in terms of their legal compliance with State and Federal standards and their practical use in both general education and special education classrooms. The paper is to be no more than six pages in length and cite a minimum of five sources.

### **Individualize Education Plan (IEP) Process Analysis (20% of Final Grade)**

Candidates will write an individual reflection on a chosen activity and design a presentation with a group of 2-3 peers. Candidates will EACH choose one of three activities: 1) Attend and observe an IEP meeting in a local school and personally reflect on the process observed, 2) Watch simulations of mock IEP meetings and compare/contrast/analyze them 3) Interview selected IEP team members about their roles in the IEP process for identified students and reflect on findings.

After the each student has individually done their own choice of activity and written their own reflection, they will share their reflections and findings with a small group (2-3 peers) and collaborate to present their combined findings and analysis about the IEP process to the rest of the class (IEP Process Presentation Assignment). Each group must represent at least two different individual activities (i.e. if a group has 3 members, at least two of the members must have done different individual activities).

### **IEP Process Presentation**

After the each student has individually done their own choice of activity and written their own reflection for the IEP Process Analysis assignment, they will share their reflections and findings with a small group (2-3 peers) and collaborate to present their combined findings and analysis about the IEP process to the rest of the class (IEP Process Presentation Assignment). Each group must represent at least two different individual activities (i.e. if a group has 3 members, at least two of the members must have done different individual activities).

### **Participation/Engagement/Essential Dispositions (20% of Final Grade)**

Candidates engage regularly and actively in class discussions, activities, and affinity groups as a means of building self-awareness and increasing their capacity and stamina for engaging in self-reflection around issues of identity. Candidates will work to meet essential dispositions criteria in their coursework whether online or in person.

## Participation

Participation will be graded based on engagement in class discussions and activities (both online and mixed modes). Online-only courses will be determined via active engagement in weekly discussion boards or other interactive opportunities provided by the instructor. Mixed mode courses will be determined based on presence in class and engagement with content and peers both within and outside of face-to-face class sessions.
