COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is a study of disabilities identified with low-incidence disabilities. Candidates investigate the disabilities identified as Low Incidence: Developmentally Delayed, Autism Spectrum, Moderate/Severe Mental Retardation, Traumatic Brain Injury, Orthopedically Impaired, Deaf/Hard of Hearing and Visually Impaired. Components of the course will include definitions, family involvement, assessments, instructional methods, and procedural and landmark legal issues in Special Education. Candidates will be able to provide appropriate program accommodations for students identified with a low-incidence disability.

SPECIFICS OF COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

<u>Maps</u>

Candidates are assignment a student description identifying a low-incidence disability. The candidates develop a Making Action Plans (MAP) for the student. This is a two part assignment with a written report no longer than five (5) pages and present the report orally to the class in a PowerPoint format.

Communication Board Project

Candidates develop a communication board consisting of no more than eight (8) pictures for the identified student portfolio provided by the instructor. The candidate presents the communication board to the class. The candidate write a report of no more than two (2) pages to present with the communication board.

Assessment Research Project

Candidates will research assessment tests aligned with different low incidence disabilities. Candidates will chose one test and prepare a paper. The candidate will present a brief of the report to the class. The candidate will write a report of no more than five pages.

Instructor Determined Assignments, including participation

Class participation expands the participant's knowledge and ability to implement strategies learned in the course.
