COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course discusses the issues of children's biological and psychosocial development, relationship, and culture in a social context. It addresses topics such as physical, cognitive, social, and intellectual growth, language acquisition, family and peers, popularity, impact of mass media and culture on child's development.

Course activities

Class participation through discussion is an integral part of this online course, although it is typically less formal than other work submitted throughout the course. Participation is defined as active engagement in a discussion or other online activity. To provide a structure for balanced participation and allow you to maximize the benefit of the discussion boards, it is recommended that you follow these guidelines: 1) Post your responses to discussion questions in the first three days of the school week (Monday through Wednesday). 2) Post three or more thoughtful and topic-relevant comments to responses made by classmates during the last four days of the school week (Thursday through Sunday). 3) Respond to any questions that your instructor or peers have regarding your original post by the end of the school week.

Early Childhood Education Center Report

Early childhood education is very important for children as it prepares them for school. Children in US attend different preschool centers that provide various curricula. For this assignment each student will investigate an early childhood education center and is expected to make a four- to five page report on this experience. Each report should cover the following: Criteria for admission; Teacher-child ratio; Overall impression; Use of specific curriculum , including Montessori, Hooked on phonics, etc.; Cost and funding arrangements for participation; Special programs available at the center (e.g. foreign languages, art, music, etc.); Demographics of children at the center; Accreditation of the center; Credentials of the staff working within this center.

The list above is not exhaustive. Students are expected to report on all the dimensions above, and also to add any relevant insights or observations to their report.

In their papers, students should combine their own thoughtful analysis with ideas and information found in a minimum of one source other than the textbook. Therefore, as in any scholarly writing, students should not merely copy information from another author, but use evidence to support the contentions they have drawn from their findings and critically analyze related literature - this paper has to be an analytical paper, not a summary of readings. This paper must meet APA requirements of format and style. Students must cite the sources of all ideas, facts, and information used that are not their own, even if they have put the information into their own words. Failure to do so is plagiarism, even if the oversight is unintentional.

Application Papers

Students will prepare two papers, seven- to eight-page long, on specific issues of child's current and future development. Each paper should focus on a different issue, explain it in details, and discuss its effects on the child development as well as families and society in general. In their papers, students should combine their own thoughtful analysis with ideas and information found in a minimum of two sources other than the textbook. Therefore, as in any scholarly writing, students should not merely copy information from another author, but use evidence to support the contentions they have drawn from their findings and critically analyze related literature - this paper has to be an analytical paper, not a summary of readings.
